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1 This matter having come before the Honorable Mark Smith, of the Superior Court of the State
2 of California, in and for the County of Kern, at 8:30 a.m. on July 28, 2026, with Kenneth Seligson,
3 Esq., of Seligson Law P.C., Jean-Claude Lapuyade, Esq., of JCL Law Firm, APC, and Shani O. Zakay,
4 Esq. of Zakay Law Group, APLC as counsel for Plaintiff Charlie Pak (“Plaintiff Pak”), Kane Moon of
5 Moon Law Group P.C. as counsel for Plaintiff Luis Armando Delgadillo (“Plaintiff Delgadillo”), and
6 Michael W. Kelly of Squire Patton Boggs (US) LLP, appearing for Defendants Clean Earth
7 Environmental Solutions, Inc. and Rho-Chem LLC (hereinafter “Defendants”). The Court, having
8 carefully considered the briefs, argument of counsel and all the matters presented to the Court, and
9 good cause appearing, hereby GRANTS Plaintiffs’ Motion for Preliminary Approval of Class Action
10 Settlement.

11 **IT IS HEREBY ORDERED:**

12 1. The Court preliminarily approves the Class Action and PAGA Settlement Agreement
13 (“Settlement Agreement” or “Agreement”), a true and correct copy of which is attached hereto as
14 **Exhibit 1**. This is based on the Court’s determination that the Settlement Agreement is within the
15 range of possible final approval, pursuant to the provisions of Section 382 of the California Code of
16 Civil Procedure and California Rules of Court, rule 3.769.

17 2. This Order incorporates by reference the definitions in the Agreement, and all terms
18 defined therein shall have the same meaning in this Order as set forth in the Agreement.

19 3. Subject to the terms of the Settlement Agreement, the Gross Settlement Amount that
20 Defendants shall pay is Five Hundred Ninety-Five Thousand Dollars (\$595,000). It appears to the
21 Court on a preliminary basis that the settlement amount and terms are fair, adequate, and reasonable as
22 to all Class Members when balanced against the probable outcome of further litigation relating to
23 certification, liability, and damages issues. It further appears that investigation and research have been
24 conducted such that counsel for the Parties are able to reasonably evaluate their respective positions. It
25 further appears to the Court that settlement at this time will avoid substantial additional costs by all
26 Parties, as well as avoid the delay and risks that would be presented by the further prosecution of the
27 litigation. It further appears that the Settlement has been reached as the result of intensive, serious, and
28 non-collusive arms-length negotiations.

1 4. The Court preliminarily finds that the Settlement appears to be within the range of
2 reasonableness of a settlement that could ultimately be given final approval by this Court. The Court
3 has reviewed the monetary recovery that is being granted as part of the Settlement and preliminarily
4 finds that the monetary settlement awards made available to the Class Members are fair, adequate, and
5 reasonable when balanced against the probable outcome of further litigation relating to certification,
6 liability, and damages issues.

7 5. Plaintiffs seek Attorneys' Fees and Costs in the amount of 35% of the Gross Settlement
8 Amount for attorneys' fees, currently estimated at Two Hundred Eight Thousand Four Hundred
9 Twenty-Five Dollars (\$208,250) plus a reimbursement of reasonably incurred expenses in an amount
10 of up to Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000), and a proposed Service Payment to each Class
11 Representative, Luis Armando Delgadillo and Charlie Pak, in an amount of not more than Ten
12 Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) to each Class Representative. While these awards appear to be within the
13 range of reasonableness, the Court will not approve the Attorneys Fees and Costs, or the Service
14 Payments until the Final Approval Hearing.

15 6. The Court recognizes that Plaintiffs and Defendants stipulate and agree to certification
16 of a class for settlement purposes only. This stipulation will not be deemed admissible in this, or any
17 other proceeding should this Settlement not become final. For settlement purposes only, the Court
18 conditionally certifies the following Class:

19 all current and former non-exempt employees who worked for Rho-Chem LLC and Clean Earth
20 Environmental Solutions Inc. in California any time or times between February 10, 2024, to
21 December 18, 2025, (the "Class Period"), and excluding any persons who are currently
22 represented by counsel and have a civil action pending, and also excluding any persons who opt-
23 out of the class.

24 7. The Court concludes that, for settlement purposes only, the Class meets the requirements
25 for certification under section 382 of the California Code of Civil Procedure in that: (a) the Class is
26 ascertainable and so numerous that joinder of all members of the Class Members is impracticable; (b)
27 common questions of law and fact predominate, and there is a well-defined community of interest
28 amongst the Class Members with respect to the subject matter of the litigation; (c) the claims of the

1 Class Representatives are typical of the claims of the Class Members; (d) the Class Representatives
2 will fairly and adequately protect the interests of the Class Members; (e) a class action is superior to
3 other available methods for the efficient adjudication of this controversy; and (f) Class Counsel are
4 qualified to act as counsel for the Class Representatives in their individual capacity and as the
5 representative of the Class Members.

6 8. The Court provisionally appoints Plaintiff Delgadillo and Plaintiff Pak as the
7 representatives of the Class.

8 9. The Court provisionally appoints Kenneth Seligson, Esq. of Seligson Law, P.C., Jean-
9 Claude Lapuyade, Esq., of JCL Law Firm, APC, Shani Zakay, of Zakay Law Group, APLC, and Kane
10 Moon of Moon Law Group P.C. as Class Counsel for the Class Members.

11 10. The Court hereby approves, as to form and content, the Proposed Class Notice (“Class
12 Notice”) attached to the Agreement as **Exhibit A**. The Court finds that the notice appears to fully and
13 accurately inform the Class Members and Aggrieved Employees of all material elements of the
14 proposed Settlement, including the right of any Class Member to be excluded from the Class by
15 submitting a written request for exclusion, and of each Class Member’s right and opportunity to object
16 to the Settlement. The Court further finds that the distribution of the notices substantially in the manner
17 and form set forth in the Agreement and this Order meets the requirements of due process, is the most
18 reasonable notice under the circumstances, and shall constitute due and sufficient notice to all persons
19 entitled thereto. The Court orders the mailing of the notices by first class mail, pursuant to the terms
20 set forth in the Agreement.

21 11. The Court hereby appoints APEX Class Action Administration as Settlement
22 Administrator. Within fourteen (14) days after the Preliminary Approval Date, Defendants shall
23 provide the Settlement Administrator with the Class Data, including information regarding Class
24 Members that Defendants will in good faith compile from its records, including each Class Member’s
25 full name, last-known mailing address, Social Security number, telephone number, and number of Class
26 Period Workweeks and PAGA Pay Periods. No later than seven (7) calendar days after receiving the
27 class data, the Settlement Administrator shall mail copies of the Notice Packet to all Class Members
28 via first class U.S. Mail.

1 12. The Court hereby preliminarily approves the proposed procedure for exclusion from the
2 Settlement. Any Class Member may individually choose to opt out of and be excluded from the
3 Settlement as provided in the Notice by following the instructions for requesting exclusion from the
4 Settlement of the Released Class Claims that are set forth in the Notice. All requests for exclusion must
5 be postmarked or received by the Response Deadline which is sixty (60) calendar days after the
6 Settlement Administrator mails the Notice Packets to Class Members or, in the case of re-mailed
7 Notice, not more than fourteen (14) days from the original Response Deadline. Any such person who
8 chooses to opt out of and be excluded from the Settlement will not be entitled to an Individual Class
9 Payment under the Settlement and will not be bound by the Class Release provisions in the Agreement,
10 or have any right to object, appeal or comment thereon. Class Members who have not requested
11 exclusion shall be bound by all determinations of the Court, the Agreement, and Judgment.

12 13. Any Class Member may appear at the final approval hearing, regardless of whether they
13 have submitted a timely written objection and notice of intention to appear. Class Members may
14 express their views regarding the Settlement and may present evidence and file briefs or other papers
15 that may be proper and relevant to the issues to be heard and determined by the Court as provided in
16 the Notice. Class Members will have sixty (60) calendar days (plus an additional 14 days from Class
17 Members whose Class Notice is remailed) from the date the Settlement Administrator mails the Class
18 Notice to postmark their written objections to the Settlement Administrator.

19 14. A Final Approval Hearing shall be held before this Court on November 18, 2026
20 at 8:30 ~~AM/PM~~ in Department T-2 of the Kern County Superior Court
21 to determine all necessary matters concerning the Settlement, including: whether the proposed
22 settlement of the Action on the terms and conditions provided for in the Agreement is fair, adequate
23 and reasonable and should be finally approved by the Court; whether an Order Granting Final Approval
24 should be entered herein; whether the plan of allocation contained in the Agreement should be approved
25 as fair, adequate and reasonable to the Class; and to finally approve the Attorneys' Fees and Costs,
26 Service Payments, and the Administration Expenses Payment. All papers in support of the Motion for
27 Final Approval and the Motion for Attorneys' Fees and Costs and Service Payments shall be filed with
28 the Court no later than sixteen (16) court days prior to the Final Approval Hearing.

1 15. In the event the Settlement does not become effective in accordance with the terms of the
2 Agreement, or the Settlement is not finally approved, or is terminated, canceled, or fails to become
3 effective for any reason, this Settlement Agreement shall be rendered null and void and shall be vacated,
4 and the Parties shall revert to their respective positions as of before entering into the Agreement. In
5 such an event, the Court's orders regarding the Settlement, including this Preliminary Approval Order,
6 shall not be used or referred to in litigation for any purpose. Nothing in this paragraph is intended to
7 alter the terms of the Settlement Agreement with respect to the effect of the Settlement Agreement if it
8 is not approved.

9 16. The Court reserves the right to adjourn or continue the date of the final approval hearing
10 and all dates provided for in the Agreement without further notice to Class Members and retains
11 jurisdiction to consider all further applications arising out of or connected with the proposed Settlement.

EXHIBIT 1

CLASS ACTION AND PAGA SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT AND CLASS NOTICE

This Class Action and PAGA Settlement Agreement (“Agreement”) is made by and between plaintiffs CHARLIE PAK (“Pak”) and LUIS ARMANDO DELGADILLO (“Delgadillo”) (collectively “Plaintiffs”) and defendants RHO-CHEM, LLC (“RHO-CHEM”) and CLEAN EARTH ENVIRONMENTAL SOLUTIONS, INC. (“Clean Earth”) (collectively “Defendants”). The Agreement refers to Plaintiffs and Defendants collectively as “Parties,” or individually as “Party.”

1. DEFINITIONS.

- 1.1 “Action” means the wage and hour lawsuit entitled *Luis Armando Delgadillo and Charlie Pak v. Clean Earth Environmental Solutions, Inc., et al.*, Kern County Superior Court Case No. BCV-25-100802, initiated on March 6, 2025.
- 1.2 “Administrator” means Apex Class Action, the neutral entity the Parties have agreed to appoint to administer the Settlement.
- 1.3 “Administration Expenses Payment” means the amount the Administrator will be paid from the Gross Settlement Amount to reimburse its reasonable fees and expenses in accordance with the Administrator’s “not to exceed” bid submitted to the Court in connection with Preliminary Approval of the Settlement.
- 1.4 “Aggrieved Employee” means a person employed by Defendants in California and classified as a non-exempt employee during the PAGA Period.
- 1.5 “Class” means all persons employed by any Defendants in California and classified as a non-exempt employee who worked for Defendants during the Class Period.
- 1.6 “Class Counsel” means Kenneth Seligson of Seligson Law, P.C., Shani Zakay of Zakay Law Group, Jean-Claude Lapuyade of JCL Law Firm, and Kane Moon of Moon Law Group, P.C.
- 1.7 “Class Counsel Fees Payment” and “Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment” mean the amounts allocated to Class Counsel for reimbursement of reasonable attorneys’ fees and expenses, respectively, incurred to prosecute the Action.
- 1.8 “Class Data” means Class Member identifying information in Defendants’ possession including the Class Member’s name, last-known mailing address, Social Security number, and number of Class Period Workweeks and PAGA Pay Periods.
- 1.9 “Class Member” or “Settlement Class Member” means a member of the Class, as either a Participating Class Member or Non-Participating Class Member (including a Non- Participating Class Member who qualifies as an Aggrieved Employee).
- 1.10 “Address Search” means the Administrator’s investigation and search for current Class Member or Aggrieved Employee mailing addresses using all

reasonably available sources, methods and means including, but not limited to, the National Change of Address database, skip traces, and direct contact by the Administrator with Class Members or Aggrieved Employees.

- 1.11 “Class Notice” means the COURT APPROVED NOTICE OF CLASS ACTION SETTLEMENT AND HEARING DATE FOR FINAL COURT APPROVAL, to be mailed to Class Members in English in the form, without material variation, attached as Exhibit A and incorporated by reference into this Agreement.
- 1.12 “Class Period” means the period from February 10, 2024 to December 18, 2025.
- 1.13 “Class Representative” means the named Plaintiffs in the operative complaint in the Action seeking Court approval to serve as a class representative.
- 1.14 “Class Representative Service Payment” means the payment to the Class Representative for initiating the Action and providing services in support of the Action.
- 1.15 “Court” means the Superior Court of California, County of Kern.
- 1.16 “Defendants” mean RHO-CHEM, LLC and Clean Earth Environmental Solutions, Inc. and its past, present and/or future, direct and/or indirect, officers, directors, members, managers, employees, agents, representatives, attorneys, insurers, partners, investors, shareholders, administrators, subsidiaries, divisions, predecessors, successors, assigns, and joint venturers.
- 1.17 “Defense Counsel” means Michael W. Kelly of Squire Patton Boggs (US) LLP.
- 1.18 “Effective Date” means the later of the following: (a) if no timely objections are filed or if all objections are withdrawn, the date upon which the Court enters Final Approval; (b) if an objection is filed and not withdrawn, the date for filing an appeal and no such appeal being filed; or (c) if any timely appeals are filed, the date of the resolution (or withdrawal) of any such appeal in a way that does not alter the terms of the settlement.
- 1.19 “Final Approval” means the Court’s order granting final approval of the Settlement.
- 1.20 “Final Approval Hearing” means the Court’s hearing on the Motion for Final Approval of the Settlement.
- 1.21 “Gross Settlement Amount” means \$595,000.00 which is the total amount Defendants agree to pay under the Settlement. The Gross Settlement Amount will be used to pay Individual Class Payments, Individual PAGA Payments, the LWDA PAGA Payment, Class Counsel Fees Payment, Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment, Class Representative Service Payment, and Administration Expenses Payment.

- 1.22 “Individual Class Payment” means the Participating Class Member’s pro rata share of the Net Settlement Amount calculated according to the number of Workweeks worked during the Class Period.
- 1.23 “Individual PAGA Payment” means the Aggrieved Employee’s pro rata share of 35% of the PAGA Penalties calculated according to the number of PAGA Pay Periods worked during the PAGA Period.
- 1.24 “Judgment” means the judgment entered by the Court based upon the Final Approval.
- 1.25 “LWDA” means the California Labor and Workforce Development Agency.
- 1.26 “LWDA PAGA Payment” means the 65% of the PAGA Penalties paid to the LWDA under Labor Code section 2699, subdivision (i).
- 1.27 “Net Settlement Amount” means the Gross Settlement Amount, less the following payments in the amounts approved by the Court: Individual PAGA Payments, LWDA PAGA Payment, Class Representative Service Payment, Class Counsel Fees Payment, Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment, and Administration Expenses Payment. The remainder is to be paid to Participating Class Members as Individual Class Payments.
- 1.28 “Non-Participating Class Member” means any Class Member who opts out of the Settlement by sending the Administrator a valid and timely Request for Exclusion.
- 1.29 “PAGA Pay Period” means any pay period during which an Aggrieved Employee worked for Defendants for at least one day during the PAGA Period.
- 1.30 “PAGA Period” means the period from February 10, 2024 to December 18, 2025.
- 1.31 “PAGA” means the Private Attorneys General Act (Lab. Code, § 2698 et seq.).
- 1.32 “PAGA Notice” means Pak’s November 7, 2024 PAGA Notice letter to RHO-CHEM and the LWDA, Pak’s July 31, 2025 amended PAGA Notice letter to Clean Earth and the LWDA, and Delgadillo’s PAGA notice letter to Clean Earth and the LWDA providing notice pursuant to Labor Code section 2699.3, subdivision (a).
- 1.33 “PAGA Penalties” means the total amount of PAGA civil penalties to be paid from the Gross Settlement Amount, allocated 35% to the Aggrieved Employees (\$7,000.00) and 65% to the LWDA (\$13,000.00) in settlement of PAGA claims.
- 1.34 “Participating Class Member” means a Class Member who does not submit a valid and timely Request for Exclusion from the Settlement.
- 1.35 “Plaintiffs” mean Charlie Pak and Luis Armando Delgadillo, the named plaintiffs in the Action.

- 1.36 “Preliminary Approval” means the Court’s order granting preliminary approval of the Settlement.
- 1.37 “Released Class Claims” means the claims being released as described in Paragraph 5.2 below.
- 1.38 “Released PAGA Claims” means the claims being released as described in Paragraph 5.3 below.
- 1.39 “Released Parties” means RHO-CHEM LLC and CLEAN EARTH ENVIRONMENTAL SOLUTIONS, INC. and their parents and affiliates.
- 1.40 “Request for Exclusion” means a Class Member’s submission of a written request to be excluded from the Class Settlement signed by the Class Member.
- 1.41 “Response Deadline” means 60 days after the Administrator mails the Class Notice and shall be the last date on which Class Members may: (a) fax, email or mail Requests for Exclusion, (b) fax, email or mail objections to the Settlement, or (c) fax, email or mail a challenge to the number of Workweeks allocated to the Class Member in the Class Notice. Class Members to whom Class Notices are resent after having been returned undeliverable to the Administrator shall have their deadline extended an additional 14 calendar days beyond the Response Deadline.
- 1.42 “Settlement” means the disposition of the Action effected by this Agreement and the Judgment.
- 1.43 “Workweek” means any week during which a Class Member worked for Defendants for at least one day or received pay from Defendants for vacation or other paid leave, during the Class Period.

2. RECITALS.

On January 16, 2025, Plaintiff Pak filed a complaint alleging causes of action against RHO CHEM for (1) Unfair Competition in Violation of Cal. Business & Professions Code § 17200 et seq.; (2) Failure to Pay Minimum Wages in Violation of Cal. Labor Code §§ 1194, 1197 & 1197.1; (3) Failure to Pay Overtime Wages in Violation of Cal. Labor Code §§ 510, et seq.; (4) Failure to Provide Required Meal Periods in Violation of Cal. Labor Code §§ 226.7 & 512 And the Applicable Wage Order; (5) Failure to Provide Required Rest Periods in Violation of Cal. Labor Code §§ 226.7 & 512 And the Applicable Wage Order; (6) Failure to Provide Wages When Due in Violation of Cal. Labor Code §§ 201, 202, and 203; (7) Failure to Provide Accurate Itemize Wage Statements in Violation of Cal. Labor Code § 226; (8) Failure to Reimburse Employees for Required Expenses in Violation of Cal. Labor Code § 2802; and (9) Violation Of The Private Attorneys General Act [Labor Code §2698 et seq.]. On March 6, 2025, Plaintiff Delgadillo filed a Complaint alleging (1) Failure to Pay Minimum Wages [Cal. Lab. Code §§ 204, 1194, 1194.2, and 1197]; (2) Failure to Pay Overtime Compensation [Cal. Lab. Code §§ 1194 and 1198]; (3) Failure to Provide Meal Periods [Cal. Lab. Code §§ 226.7, 512]; (4) Failure to Authorize and Permit Rest Breaks [Cal. Lab. Code §§ 226.7]; (5) Failure to Indemnify Necessary Business Expenses [Cal. Lab. Code § 2802]; (6) Failure

to Timely Pay Final Wages at Termination [Cal. Lab. Code §§ 201-203]; (7) Failure to Provide Accurate Itemized Wage Statements [Cal. Lab. Code § 226]; and (8) Unfair Business Practices [Cal. Bus. & Prof. Code §§ 17200, et seq.]. On May 9, 2025, Plaintiff Delgadillo filed a First Amended Complaint alleging a single representative cause of action under the Private Attorneys General Act [Cal. Lab. Code § 2699, et. seq.]. On July 25, 2025, Plaintiff Pak filed a First Amended Complaint to include Defendant Clean Earth. On February 10, 2026, Plaintiff Delgadillo filed a Second Amended Complaint adding Plaintiff Pak as an additional class and PAGA representative and RHO-CHEM as an additional defendant. Plaintiff Delgadillo's Second Amended Complaint is the operative complaint in the Action (the "Operative Complaint"). Defendants deny the allegations in the Operative Complaint, deny any failure to comply with the laws identified in the Operative Complaint and deny any and all liability for the causes of action alleged.

- 2.1 Pursuant to Labor Code section 2699.3, subdivision (a), Plaintiffs gave timely written notice to Defendants and the LWDA by sending the PAGA Notices.
- 2.2 On December 17, 2025, the Parties participated in an all-day mediation presided over by Jason Marsili, Esq. which led to this Agreement to settle the Action.
- 2.3 Before mediation, Plaintiffs obtained, through informal discovery, the employee file, personnel records, payroll data, timecards, and other employment-related materials. Plaintiffs' investigation was sufficient to satisfy the criteria for court approval set forth in *Dunk v. Foot Locker Retail, Inc.* (1996) 48 Cal.App.4th 1794, 1801 and *Kullar v. Foot Locker Retail, Inc.* (2008) 168 Cal.App.4th 116, 129-130 ("*Dunk/Kullar*").
- 2.4 The Court has not granted class certification.
- 2.5 The Parties, Class Counsel and Defense Counsel represent they are not aware of any other pending matter or action asserting claims that will be extinguished or affected by the Settlement.

3. MONETARY TERMS.

- 3.1 Gross Settlement Amount. Defendants promise to pay \$595,000.00 and no more as the Gross Settlement Amount, and to separately pay any and all employer payroll taxes owed on the Wage Portions (as defined below) of the Individual Class Payments. Defendants have no obligation to pay the Gross Settlement Amount (or any payroll taxes) before the deadline stated in Paragraph 4.2. The Administrator will disburse the entire Gross Settlement Amount without asking or requiring Participating Class Members or Aggrieved Employees to submit any claim as a condition of payment. None of the Gross Settlement Amount will revert to Defendants.
- 3.2 Payments from the Gross Settlement Amount. The Administrator will make and deduct the following payments from the Gross Settlement Amount, in the amounts specified by the Court in the Final Approval:
 - 3.2.1 To Plaintiffs: Class Representative Service Payment of not more than \$10,000.00 to each plaintiff, for a total of \$20,000.00, in addition to any Individual

Class Payment and any Individual PAGA Payment the Class Representative is entitled to receive as Participating Class Member. Defendants will not oppose Plaintiffs' requests for Class Representative Service Payments that do not exceed this amount. As part of the Motion for Final Approval, Plaintiffs will seek Court approval for any Class Representative Service Payments. If the Court approves a Class Representative Service Payment less than the amount requested, the Administrator will retain the remainder in the Net Settlement Amount. The Administrator will pay the Class Representative Service Payments using IRS Form 1099. Plaintiffs assume full responsibility and liability for employee taxes owed on the Class Representative Service Payments.

3.2.2 To Class Counsel: A Class Counsel Fees Payment of not more than 35%, which is currently estimated to be \$208,250.00, and a Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment of not more than \$30,000.00. Defendants will not oppose requests for these payments provided they do not exceed these amounts. As part of the Motion for Final Approval, Plaintiffs and/or Class Counsel may seek Court approval of a Class Counsel Fees Payment and Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment. In support of the Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment, Class Counsel must submit a cost ledger listing each expense incurred during the Action. If the Court approves a Class Counsel Fees Payment or a Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment less than the amount requested, the Administrator will allocate the remainder to the Net Settlement Amount. Released Parties shall have no liability to Class Counsel or any other Plaintiffs' Counsel arising from any claim to any portion of any Class Counsel Fee Payment and/or Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment. The Administrator will pay the Class Counsel Fees Payment and Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment using one or more IRS 1099 Forms. Class Counsel assumes full responsibility and liability for taxes owed on the Class Counsel Fees Payment and the Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment and holds Defendants harmless, and indemnifies Defendants, from any dispute or controversy regarding any division or sharing of any of these payments.

3.2.3 To the Administrator: An Administration Expenses Payment not to exceed \$6,900.00 except for a showing of good cause and as approved by the Court. To the extent the administration expenses are less than or the Court approves payment less than \$6,900.00, the Administrator will retain the remainder in the Net Settlement Amount.

3.2.4 To Each Participating Class Member: An Individual Class Payment, which the Administrator shall calculate by (a) dividing the Net Settlement Amount by the total number of Workweeks worked by all Participating Class Members during the Class Period and (b) multiplying the result by each Participating Class Member's Workweeks.

3.2.4.1 Tax Allocation of Individual Class Payments. 20% of each Participating Class Member's Individual Class Payment will be allocated to settlement of wage claims (the "Wage Portion"). The Wage Portions are subject to tax withholding and will be reported on an IRS W-2 Form. The Administrator

shall allocate the remainder of each Participating Class Member's Individual Class Payment as non-wages for tax purposes (the "Non-Wage Portion"). The Non-Wage Portions are not subject to wage withholdings and will be reported on IRS 1099 Forms. Participating Class Members assume full responsibility and liability for any employee taxes owed on their Individual Class Payment.

3.2.4.2 Effect of Non-Participating Class Members on Calculation of Individual Class Payments. Non-Participating Class Members will not receive any Individual Class Payments. The Administrator will retain amounts equal to their Individual Class Payments in the Net Settlement Amount for distribution to Participating Class Members on a pro rata basis.

3.2.5 To the LWDA and Aggrieved Employees: PAGA Penalties in the amount of \$20,000.00 to be paid from the Gross Settlement Amount, with 65% (\$13,000.00) allocated to the LWDA PAGA Payment and 35% (\$7,000.00) allocated to the Individual PAGA Payments.

3.2.5.1 The Administrator will calculate each Individual PAGA Payment by (a) dividing the amount of the Aggrieved Employees' 35% share of PAGA Penalties (\$7,000.00) by the total number of PAGA Pay Periods worked by all Aggrieved Employees during the PAGA Period and (b) multiplying the result by each Aggrieved Employee's PAGA Pay Periods. Aggrieved Employees assume full responsibility and liability for any taxes owed on their Individual PAGA Payment.

3.2.5.2 If the Court approves PAGA Penalties of less than the amount requested, the Administrator will allocate the remainder to the Net Settlement Amount. The Administrator will report the Individual PAGA Payments on IRS 1099 Forms.

4. SETTLEMENT FUNDING AND PAYMENTS.

4.1 Class Size Estimates. Based on a review of its records to date, Defendants estimate there are 422 Class Members who collectively worked a total of 27,220 Workweeks, and 422 Aggrieved Employees who worked a total of 13,664 PAGA Pay Periods.

4.2 Funding of Gross Settlement Amount. Defendants shall fully fund the Gross Settlement Amount, and also fund the amounts necessary to fully pay Defendants' share of payroll taxes, by transmitting the funds to the Administrator no later than 30 days after the Effective Date.

4.3 Payments from the Gross Settlement Amount. Within 14 days after Defendants fund the Gross Settlement Amount, the Administrator will mail checks for all Individual Class Payments, all Individual PAGA Payments, the LWDA PAGA Payment, the Administration Expenses Payment, the Class Counsel Fees Payment, the Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment, and the Class Representative Service Payments.

Disbursement of the Class Counsel Fees Payment, the Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment and the Class Representative Service Payments shall not precede disbursement of Individual Class Payments and Individual PAGA Payments.

4.3.1 The Administrator will issue checks for the Individual Class Payments and Individual PAGA Payments and send them to the Class Members and Aggrieved Employees via First Class U.S. Mail, postage prepaid. The face of each check shall prominently state the date (not less than 180 days after the date of mailing) when the check will be voided. The Administrator will cancel all checks not cashed by the void date. The Administrator will send checks for Individual Settlement Payments to all Participating Class Members (including those for whom Class Notice was returned undelivered). The Administrator will send checks for Individual PAGA Payments to all Aggrieved Employees including Non-Participating Class Members who qualify as Aggrieved Employees (including those for whom Class Notice was returned undelivered). The Administrator may send Participating Class Members who are also Aggrieved Employees a single check combining the Individual Class Payment and the Individual PAGA Payment. Before mailing any checks, the Settlement Administrator must update the recipients' mailing addresses using the National Change of Address Database.

4.3.2 The Administrator must conduct an Address Search for all Class Members and Aggrieved Employees whose checks are returned undelivered without a United States Postal Service ("USPS") forwarding address. Within 7 days of receiving a returned check the Administrator must re-mail the check to the USPS forwarding address provided or to an address ascertained through the Address Search. The Administrator need not take further steps to deliver checks to Class Members or Aggrieved Employees whose re-mailed checks are returned as undelivered. The Administrator shall promptly send a replacement check to any Class Member or Aggrieved Employee whose original check was lost or misplaced, as requested by the Class Member or Aggrieved Employee before the void date.

4.3.3 For any Class Member whose Individual Class Payment check is uncashed and cancelled after the void date, the Administrator shall transmit the funds represented by such checks to the California Controller's Unclaimed Property Fund in the name of the Class Member thereby leaving no "unpaid residue" subject to the requirements of California Code of Civil Procedure Section 384, subd. (b).

4.3.4 For any Aggrieved Employee whose Individual PAGA Payment check is uncashed and cancelled after the void date, the Administrator shall transmit the funds represented by such check to the California Controller's Unclaimed Property Fund in the name of the Aggrieved Employee thereby leaving no "unpaid residue" subject to the requirements of Code of Civil Procedure section 384, subdivision (b).

4.3.5 The payment of Individual Class Payments and Individual PAGA Payments shall not obligate Defendants to confer any additional benefits or make any additional payments to Class Members or Aggrieved Employees (such as 401(k) contributions or bonuses) beyond those specified in this Agreement.

5. RELEASES OF CLAIMS. Effective on the date when Defendants fully fund the entire Gross Settlement Amount and funds all employer payroll taxes owed on the Wage Portion of the Individual Class Payments, Plaintiff, Class Members, Aggrieved Employees, and Class Counsel will release claims against all Released Parties as follows:

5.1 Plaintiffs' General Release. Plaintiffs and Plaintiffs' respective former and present representatives, agents, attorneys, administrators, successors and assigns, release and discharge Released Parties from all claims, transactions or occurrences that can be released by law including, but not limited to:

(a) all claims that were, or reasonably could have been, alleged based on the facts contained in the Operative Complaint; (b) all PAGA claims that were, or reasonably could have been, alleged based on facts contained in the Operative Complaint and Plaintiffs' PAGA Notices; and (c) any and all other claims whether pursuant to the common law, contract, equity or any statute, regulation, ordinance or other law. ("Plaintiffs Release.") Plaintiffs' Release does not extend to any claims or actions to enforce this Agreement, or to any claims for vested benefits, unemployment benefits, disability benefits, social security benefits, or workers' compensation benefits that arose at any time, or based on occurrences outside the Class Period. Plaintiffs acknowledge that Plaintiffs may discover facts or law different from, or in addition to, the facts or law that Plaintiffs now know or believe to be true but agree, nonetheless, that Plaintiffs' Release shall be and remain effective in all respects, notwithstanding such different or additional facts or Plaintiffs' discovery of them.

5.1.1 Plaintiffs' Waiver of Rights Under Civil Code Section 1542. For purposes of Plaintiffs' Release, Plaintiffs expressly waive and relinquish the provisions, rights, and benefits, if any, of section 1542 of the Civil Code, which reads:

A general release does not extend to claims that the creditor or releasing party does not know or suspect to exist in his or her favor at the time of executing the release, and that if known by him or her would have materially affected his or her settlement with the debtor or released party.

5.2 Release by Participating Class Members:

All Participating Class Members, on behalf of themselves and their respective former and present representatives, agents, attorneys, administrators, successors and assigns, release Released Parties from all claims that were alleged, or reasonably could have been alleged, based on the facts and allegations in the Operative Complaint in the Action, including factual claims regarding Defendants' alleged: (i) failure to pay all regular wages, minimum wages and overtime wages due; (ii) failure to provide meal periods or compensation in lieu thereof; (iii) failure to provide rest periods or compensation in lieu thereof; (iv) failure to pay wages timely at time of termination or resignation; (v) failure to provide timely pay wages during employment; (vi) failure to provide complete, accurate wage statements; (vii) failure to reimburse necessary business expenses; and (viii) unfair business practices. This release shall apply to claims arising during the Class Period. Except as set forth in Section 5.3 of this Agreement, Participating Class Members do not release any other claims, including claims for vested benefits, wrongful

termination, violation of the Fair Employment and Housing Act, unemployment insurance, disability, social security, or workers' compensation or claims based on events occurring outside the Class Period.

5.3 Release by Aggrieved Employees:

All Aggrieved Employees are deemed to release, on behalf of themselves and their respective former and present representatives, agents, attorneys, administrators, successors and assigns, the Released Parties from all claims for PAGA Penalties that were alleged, or reasonably could have been alleged, based on the facts and allegations in the Operative Complaint that are alleged to have occurred during the PAGA Period and the PAGA Notices including, but not limited to penalties that could have been awarded pursuant to Labor Code sections 201, 201.3, 202, 203, 204, 210, 218.5, 218.6, 226, 226.2, 226.3, 226.7, 246, 510, 512, 558, 1174(d), 1174.5, 1194, 1197, 1197.1, 1197.14, 1198, 1199, 2802, 2804, 2699.5, and the applicable IWC Wage Order(s).

6. **MOTION FOR PRELIMINARY APPROVAL.** The Parties agree to jointly prepare and file a motion for preliminary approval ("Motion for Preliminary Approval") that complies with the Court's current checklist for Preliminary Approvals.

6.1 Defendants' Declaration in Support of Preliminary Approval. Within 14 days of the full execution of this Agreement, Defendants will prepare and deliver to Class Counsel a signed declaration from Defendants and Defense Counsel disclosing all facts relevant to any actual or potential conflicts of interest with the Administrator. In their declarations, Defense Counsel and Defendants shall aver whether they are aware of any other pending matter or action asserting claims that will be extinguished or adversely affected by the Settlement.

6.2 Plaintiffs' Responsibilities. Plaintiffs will prepare and deliver to Defense Counsel all documents necessary for obtaining Preliminary Approval, including: (i) a draft of the notice and memorandum in support of the Motion for Preliminary Approval that includes an analysis of the Settlement under *Dunk/Kullar* and a request for approval of the PAGA Settlement under Labor Code section 2699, subdivision (f)(2); (ii) a draft proposed Order Granting Preliminary Approval and Approval of PAGA Settlement; (iii) a draft proposed Class Notice; (iv) a signed declaration from each Class Counsel firm attesting to its competency to represent the Class Members; and its timely transmission to the LWDA of all necessary PAGA documents (PAGA Notice (Lab. Code, § 2699.3, subd. (a)), Operative Complaint (Lab. Code, § 2699, subd. (l)(1)), and the Agreement (Lab. Code, § 2699, subd. (l)(2)); and (v) all facts relevant to any actual or potential conflict of interest with Class Members, or the Administrator. In their declarations, Plaintiffs and Class Counsel shall aver whether they are aware of any other pending matter or action asserting claims that will be extinguished or adversely affected by the Settlement.

6.3 Responsibilities of Counsel. Class Counsel and Defense Counsel are jointly responsible for expeditiously finalizing and filing the Motion for Preliminary Approval no later than 30 days after the full execution of this Agreement; obtaining a prompt hearing date for the Motion for Preliminary Approval; and appearing in Court to

advocate in favor of the Motion for Preliminary Approval. Class Counsel is responsible for delivering the Court's Preliminary Approval to the Administrator.

- 6.4 Duty to Cooperate. If the Parties disagree on any aspect of the proposed Motion for Preliminary Approval and/or the supporting declarations and documents, Class Counsel and Defense Counsel will expeditiously work together by meeting in person or by telephone, and in good faith, to resolve the disagreement. If the Court does not grant Preliminary Approval or conditions Preliminary Approval on any material change to this Agreement, Class Counsel and Defense Counsel will expeditiously work together by meeting in person or by telephone and in good faith to modify the Agreement and otherwise satisfy the Court's concerns.

7. SETTLEMENT ADMINISTRATION.

- 7.1 Selection of Administrator. The Parties have jointly selected Apex Class Action Administration to serve as the Administrator and verified that, as a condition of appointment, Apex Class Action Administration agrees to be bound by this Agreement and to perform, as a fiduciary, all duties specified in this Agreement in exchange for the Administration Expenses Payment. The Parties and their Counsel represent that they have no interest or relationship, financial or otherwise, with the Administrator other than a professional relationship arising out of prior experiences administering settlements.
- 7.2 Employer Identification Number. The Administrator shall have and use its own Employer Identification Number for purposes of calculating payroll tax withholdings and providing reports state and federal tax authorities.
- 7.3 Qualified Settlement Fund. The Administrator shall establish a settlement fund that meets the requirements of a Qualified Settlement Fund under US Treasury Regulation section 468B-1.
- 7.4 Notice to Class Members.
- 7.4.1 Not later than 14 days after the Court grants Preliminary Approval, Defendants will deliver the Class Data to the Administrator, in the form of a Microsoft Excel spreadsheet, containing the following information for each Class Member: (1) full name; (2) last known home address; (3) last known telephone number; (4) social security number; (5) start and end dates of active employment of each Class Member during the Class Period; (6) total Workweeks during the Class Period; (7) total pay periods during the PAGA Period; and (8) any other information required by the Settlement Administrator in order to effectuate the terms of the Settlement ("Class List"). This is a material term of the Settlement, and if Defendants fail to comply, Plaintiffs shall have the right to void the Settlement. To protect Class Members' privacy rights, the Administrator must maintain the Class Data in confidence, use the Class Data only for purposes of this Settlement and for no other purpose, and restrict access to the Class Data to Administrator employees who need access to effect

and perform under this Agreement. Defendants have a continuing duty to immediately notify Class Counsel if it discovers that the Class Data omitted Class Member identifying information and to provide corrected or updated Class Data as soon as reasonably feasible. Without any extension of the deadline by which Defendants must send the Class Data to the Administrator, the Parties and their counsel will expeditiously use best efforts, in good faith, to reconstruct or otherwise resolve any issues related to missing or omitted Class Data. No later than three (3) business days after receipt of the Class Data, the Administrator shall notify Class Counsel that the list has been received and state the number of Class Members, Aggrieved Employees, Workweeks and PAGA Pay Periods in the Class Data.

- 7.4.2 Using best efforts to perform as soon as possible, and in no event later than 7 days after receiving the Class Data, the Administrator will send to all Class Members identified in the Class Data, via first-class USPS mail, the Class Notice substantially in the form attached to this Agreement as Exhibit A. The first page of the Class Notice shall prominently estimate the dollar amounts of any Individual Class Payment and Individual PAGA Payment (if applicable) payable to the Class Member, and the number of Workweeks and PAGA Pay Periods (if applicable) used to calculate these amounts. Before mailing Class Notices, the Administrator shall update Class Member addresses using the National Change of Address database.
- 7.4.3 Not later than 3 business days after the Administrator's receipt of any Class Notice returned by the USPS as undelivered, the Administrator shall re-mail the Class Notice using any forwarding address provided by the USPS. If the USPS does not provide a forwarding address, the Administrator shall conduct a Class Member Address Search and re-mail the Class Notice to the most current address obtained. The Administrator has no obligation to make further attempts to locate or send Class Notice to Class Members whose Class Notice is returned by the USPS a second time.
- 7.4.4 The deadline for Class Members' written objections, challenges to Workweeks, and Requests for Exclusion will be extended for Class Members whose notices are re-mailed. Class Members to whom Class Notices are resent after having been returned undeliverable to the Administrator shall have their deadline extended an additional 14 calendar days beyond the Response Deadline. The Administrator will inform the Class Member of the extended deadline with the re-mailed Class Notice.
- 7.4.5 If the Administrator, Defendants or Class Counsel is contacted by or otherwise discovers any persons who believe they should have been included in the Class Data and should have received Class Notice, the Parties will expeditiously meet and confer in person or by telephone, and in good faith, in an effort to agree on whether to include them as Class Members. If the Parties agree, such persons will be Class Members entitled to the same rights as other Class Members, and the Administrator will send, via email or overnight delivery, a

Class Notice requiring them to exercise options under this Agreement not later than 14 days after receipt of Class Notice, or the deadline dates in the Class Notice, which ever are later.

7.5 Requests for Exclusion (Opt-Outs).

7.5.1 Class Members who wish to exclude themselves from (opt-out of) the Class Settlement must send the Administrator, by fax, email, or mail, a signed written Request for Exclusion not later than the Response Deadline. A Request for Exclusion is a letter from a Class Member or the Class Member's representative that reasonably communicates the Class Member's election to be excluded from the Settlement and includes the Class Member's name, address and email address or telephone number. To be valid, a Request for Exclusion must be timely faxed, emailed, or postmarked by the Response Deadline.

7.5.2 The Administrator may not reject a Request for Exclusion as invalid because it fails to contain all the information specified in the Class Notice. The Administrator shall accept any Request for Exclusion as valid if the Administrator can reasonably ascertain the identity of the person as a Class Member and the Class Member's desire to be excluded. The Administrator's determination shall be final and not appealable or otherwise susceptible to challenge. If the Administrator has reason to question the authenticity of a Request for Exclusion, the Administrator may demand additional proof of the Class Member's identity. The Administrator's determination of authenticity shall be final and not appealable or otherwise susceptible to challenge.

7.5.3 Every Class Member who does not submit a timely and valid Request for Exclusion is deemed to be a Participating Class Member, entitled to all benefits and bound by all terms and conditions of the Settlement, including the Participating Class Members' Release under Paragraph 5.2 of this Agreement, regardless of whether the Participating Class Member actually receives the Class Notice or objects to the Settlement.

7.5.4 Every Class Member who submits a valid and timely Request for Exclusion is a Non-Participating Class Member and shall not receive an Individual Class Payment or have the right to object to the class action components of the Settlement. Because future PAGA claims are subject to claim preclusion upon entry of the Judgment, Non-Participating Class Members who are Aggrieved Employees are deemed to release the claims identified in Paragraph 5.3 of this Agreement and are eligible for an Individual PAGA Payment.

7.6 Challenges to Calculation of Workweeks. Each Class Member shall have until the Response Deadline to challenge the number of Workweeks allocated to the Class Member in the Class Notice. The Class Member may challenge the allocation by communicating with the Administrator via fax, email or mail. The Administrator must encourage the challenging Class Member to submit supporting documentation. The Administrator has the authority to address and make final decisions consistent with the

terms of this Agreement on all Class Member challenges to the number of Workweeks. In the absence of any contrary documentation, the Administrator is entitled to presume that the Workweeks contained in the Class Notice are correct if they are consistent with the Class Data. The Administrator's determination of allocations of Workweeks is final and not appealable or otherwise susceptible to challenge. The Administrator shall promptly provide to Defense Counsel and Class Counsel copies of all challenges to calculation of Workweeks and the Administrator's determination of the challenges.

7.7 Objections to Settlement.

7.7.1 Only Participating Class Members may object to the class action components of the Settlement and this Agreement, including contesting the fairness of the Settlement and the amounts requested for the Class Counsel Fees Payment, Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment, Administration Expenses Payment, and Class Representative Service Payment.

7.7.2 Participating Class Members may send written objections to the Administrator, by fax, email or mail no later than the Response Deadline. Participating Class Members may appear in Court (or hire an attorney to appear in Court) to present oral objections at the Final Approval Hearing.

7.7.3 Non-Participating Class Members have no right to object to any of the class action components of the Settlement.

7.8 Administrator Duties. The Administrator has a duty to perform all tasks to be performed by the Administrator set forth in this Agreement or otherwise.

7.8.1 Website, Email Address and Toll-Free Number. The Administrator will establish, maintain, and use a website to post information of interest to Class Members including the date, time and location for the Final Approval Hearing and copies of the Agreement, Motion for Preliminary Approval, the Preliminary Approval, the Class Notice, the Motion for Final Approval, the Final Approval, and the Judgment. The Administrator will also maintain and monitor an email address and a toll-free telephone number to receive Class Member calls, faxes and emails.

7.8.2 Requests for Exclusion (Opt-outs) and Exclusion List. The Administrator will promptly review on a rolling basis Requests for Exclusion to ascertain their validity. Not later than 5 days after the expiration of the deadline for submitting Requests for Exclusion, the Administrator shall email a list to Class Counsel and Defense Counsel containing (a) the names and other identifying information of Class Members who have timely submitted valid Requests for Exclusion ("Exclusion List"); (b) the names and other identifying information of Class Members who have submitted invalid Requests for Exclusion; and (c) copies of all Requests for Exclusion submitted (whether valid or invalid).

7.8.3 Weekly Reports. The Administrator must, on a weekly basis, provide

written reports to Class Counsel and Defense Counsel that, among other things, tally the number of: Class Notices mailed or re-mailed, Class Notices returned undelivered, Requests for Exclusion (whether valid or invalid) received, objections received, challenges to Workweeks received and/or resolved, and checks mailed for Individual Class Payments and Individual PAGA Payments (“Weekly Report”). The Weekly Reports must include the Administrator’s assessment of the validity of Requests for Exclusion and attach copies of all Requests for Exclusion and objections received.

7.8.4 Administrator’s Declaration. Not later than 14 days before the date by which Plaintiffs are required to file the Motion for Final Approval of the Settlement, the Administrator will provide to Class Counsel and Defense Counsel, a signed declaration suitable for filing in Court attesting to its due diligence and compliance with all of its obligations under this Agreement, including, but not limited to, its mailing of Class Notice, the Class Notices returned as undelivered, the re-mailing of Class Notices, attempts to locate Class Members, the total number of Requests for Exclusion it received (both valid or invalid), and the number of written objections. The declaration shall attach the Exclusion List. The Administrator will supplement its declaration as needed or requested by the Parties and/or the Court. Class Counsel is responsible for filing the Administrator’s declaration(s) in Court.

7.8.5 Final Report by Settlement Administrator. Within 10 days after the Administrator disburses all funds in the Gross Settlement Amount, the Administrator will provide Class Counsel and Defense Counsel with a final report detailing its disbursements by employee identification number only of all payments made under this Agreement. At least 15 days before any deadline set by the Court, the Administrator will prepare, and submit to Class Counsel and Defense Counsel, a signed declaration suitable for filing in Court attesting to its disbursement of all payments required under this Agreement. Class Counsel is responsible for filing the Administrator’s declaration in Court.

8. CLASS SIZE ESTIMATES and ESCALATOR CLAUSE. The Gross Settlement Amount is based on Defendants’ representation that the Class Members worked a total of 28,376 Workweeks (worked by 420 Class Members as of December 18, 2025) during the Class Period. This is a material representation for Plaintiffs to enter into this agreement. Should the qualifying Workweeks worked by the Class Members during the Class Period ultimately increase by more than 10% (*i.e.*, by more than 2,838 Workweeks), Defendants shall either (a) increase the Gross Settlement Amount on a pro-rata basis equal to the percentage increase in the number of Workweeks worked by the Class Members above 10%, (b) change the closing date of the Class Period to the date on which the number of Workweeks reaches 31,214. For example, if the number of Workweeks increases by 11%, the Gross Settlement Amount could increase by 1%.

9. DEFENDANTS’ RIGHT TO WITHDRAW. If the number of valid Requests for Exclusion identified in the Exclusion List exceeds 10% of the total of all Class Members, Defendants may, but are not obligated, elect to withdraw from the Settlement. The Parties

agree that, if Defendants withdraws, the Settlement shall be void ab initio and have no force or effect whatsoever, and neither Party will have any further obligation to perform under this Agreement; provided, however, Defendants will remain responsible for paying all Settlement Administration Expenses incurred to that point. Defendants must notify Class Counsel and the Court of its election to withdraw not later than seven days after the Administrator sends the final Exclusion List to Defense Counsel; late elections will have no effect.

10. MOTION FOR FINAL APPROVAL. Not later than 16 court days before the calendared Final Approval Hearing, Plaintiffs will file in Court, a motion for final approval that includes a request for approval of the PAGA settlement under Labor Code section 2699, subdivision (l), a proposed Final Approval Order and a proposed Judgment (collectively “Motion for Final Approval”). Plaintiffs shall provide drafts of these documents to Defense Counsel not later than seven days before filing the Motion for Final Approval. Class Counsel and Defense Counsel will expeditiously meet and confer in person or by telephone, and in good faith, to resolve any disagreements concerning the Motion for Final Approval.

10.1 Response to Objections. Each Party retains the right to respond to any objection raised by a Participating Class Member, including the right to file responsive documents in Court no later than five court days before the Final Approval Hearing, or as otherwise ordered or accepted by the Court.

10.2 Duty to Cooperate. If the Court does not grant Final Approval or conditions Final Approval on any material change to the Settlement (including, but not limited to, the scope of release to be granted by Class Members), the Parties will expeditiously work together in good faith to address the Court’s concerns by revising the Agreement as necessary to obtain Final Approval. The Court’s decision to award less than the amounts requested for the Class Representative Service Payments, Class Counsel Fees Payment, Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment or Administration Expenses Payment shall not constitute a material modification to the Agreement within the meaning of this paragraph.

10.3 Continuing Jurisdiction of the Court. The Parties agree that, after entry of Judgment, the Court will retain jurisdiction over the Parties, Action, and the Settlement solely for purposes of (i) enforcing this Agreement or Judgment, (ii) addressing settlement administration matters and (iii) addressing such post-Judgment matters as are permitted by law.

10.4 Waiver of Right to Appeal. Provided the Judgment is consistent with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, specifically including the Class Counsel Fees Payment and Class Counsel Litigation Expenses Payment, the Parties, their respective counsel and all Participating Class Members who did not object to the Settlement, waive all rights to appeal from the Judgment, including all rights to post-judgment and appellate proceedings, the right to file motions to vacate judgment, motions for new trial, extraordinary writs and appeals. The waiver of appeal does not include any waiver of the right to oppose such motions, writs or appeals. If an objector appeals the Judgment, the Parties’ obligations to perform under this Agreement will be

suspended until such time as the appeal is finally resolved and the Judgment becomes final, except as to matters that do not affect the Net Settlement Amount.

10.5 Appellate Court Orders to Vacate, Reverse or Materially Modify Judgment. If the appellate court vacates, reverses or modifies the Judgment in a manner that requires a material modification of this Agreement (including, but not limited to, the scope of release to be granted by Class Members), this Agreement shall be null and void. The Parties shall nevertheless expeditiously work together in good faith to address the appellate court's concerns and to obtain Final Approval and entry of Judgment, sharing, on a 50-50 basis, any additional administration expenses reasonably incurred after remittitur. An appellate decision to vacate, reverse or modify the Court's award of the Class Representative Service Payment or any payments to Class Counsel shall not constitute a material modification of the Judgment within the meaning of this paragraph, as long as the Gross Settlement Amount remains unchanged.

11. AMENDED JUDGMENT. If any amended judgment is required under Code of Civil Procedure section 384, the Parties will work together in good faith to jointly submit a proposed amended judgment.

12. ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS.

12.1 No Admission of Liability. This Agreement represents a compromise and settlement of highly disputed claims. Nothing in this Agreement is intended or should be construed as an admission by Defendants that any of the allegations in the Operative Complaint have merit or that Defendants have any liability for any claims asserted; nor is it intended or should be construed as an admission by Plaintiffs that Defendants' defenses in the Action have merit. The Parties agree that class certification and representative treatment is for purposes of this Settlement only. If for any reason the Court does not grant Preliminary Approval, grant Final Approval, or enter Judgment, Defendants reserve the right to contest certification of any class for any reason, Defendants reserve all available defenses to the claims in the Action, and Plaintiffs reserve the right to move for class certification on any grounds available and to contest Defendants' defenses. The Settlement, this Agreement and Parties' willingness to settle the Action will have no bearing on, and will not be admissible in connection with, any litigation (except for proceedings to enforce or effectuate the Settlement and this Agreement).

12.2 Confidentiality Before Preliminary Approval. Plaintiff, Class Counsel, Defendants and Defense Counsel separately agree that, until the Motion for Preliminary Approval is filed, they and each of them will not disclose, disseminate, publicize, or cause or permit another person to disclose, disseminate or publicize, any of the terms of the Agreement directly or indirectly, specifically or generally, to any person, corporation, association, government agency or other entity except: (1) to the Parties' attorneys, accountants or spouses, all of whom will be instructed to keep this Agreement confidential; (2) to counsel in a related matter; (3) to the extent necessary to report income to appropriate taxing authorities; (4) in response to a court order or subpoena; or (5) in response to an inquiry or subpoena issued by a state or federal government

agency. Each Party agrees to immediately notify each other Party of any judicial or agency order, inquiry, or subpoena seeking such information. Plaintiff, Class Counsel, Defendants and Defense Counsel separately agree not to, directly or indirectly, initiate any conversation or other communication, before the filing of the Motion for Preliminary Approval, with any third party regarding this Agreement or the matters giving rise to this Agreement except to respond only that “the matter was resolved,” or words to that effect. This paragraph does not restrict Class Counsel’s communications with Class Members in accordance with Class Counsel’s ethical obligations owed to Class Members.

12.3 No Solicitation. The Parties separately agree that they and their respective counsel and employees will not solicit any Class Member to opt out of or object to the Settlement or appeal from the Judgment. Nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to restrict Class Counsel’s ability to communicate with Class Members in accordance with Class Counsel’s ethical obligations owed to Class Members.

12.4 Integrated Agreement. Upon execution by all Parties and their counsel, this Agreement together with its attached exhibits shall constitute the entire agreement between the Parties relating to the Settlement, superseding any and all oral representations, warranties, covenants or inducements made to or by any Party.

12.5 Attorney Authorization. Class Counsel and Defense Counsel separately warrant and represent that they are authorized by Plaintiffs and Defendants, respectively, to take all appropriate action required or permitted to be taken by such Parties pursuant to this Agreement to effectuate its terms, and to execute any other documents reasonably required to effectuate the terms of this Agreement including any amendments to this Agreement.

12.6 Cooperation. The Parties and their counsel will cooperate with each other and use their best efforts in good faith to implement the Settlement by, among other things, modifying the Settlement Agreement and submitting supplemental evidence and supplementing points and authorities as requested by the Court. In the event the Parties are unable to agree upon the form or content of any document necessary to implement the Settlement, or on any modification of the Agreement that may become necessary to implement the Settlement, the Parties will seek the assistance of a mediator or the Court for resolution.

12.7 No Prior Assignments. The Parties separately represent and warrant that they have not directly or indirectly assigned, transferred, encumbered or purported to assign, transfer or encumber to any person or entity any portion of any liability, claim, demand, action, cause of action or right released and discharged by the Party in this Settlement.

12.8 No Tax Advice. Neither Plaintiffs, Class Counsel, Defendants nor Defense Counsel are providing any advice regarding taxes or taxability, nor shall anything in this Settlement be relied upon as such within the meaning of United States Treasury Department Circular 230 (31 CFR Part 10, as amended) or otherwise.

- 12.9 Modification of Agreement. This Agreement, and all parts of it, may be amended, modified, changed or waived only by an express written instrument signed by all Parties or their representatives and approved by the Court.
- 12.10 Agreement Binding on Successors. This Agreement will be binding upon, and inure to the benefit of, the successors of each of the Parties.
- 12.11 Applicable Law. All terms and conditions of this Agreement and its exhibits will be governed by and interpreted according to the laws of the State of California, without regard to conflict of law principles.
- 12.12 Cooperation in Drafting. The Parties have cooperated in drafting and preparing this Agreement. This Agreement will not be construed against any Party on the basis that the Party was the drafter or participated in the drafting.
- 12.13 Confidentiality. To the extent permitted by law, all agreements made and orders entered during the Action and in this Agreement relating to the confidentiality of information shall survive the execution of this Agreement.
- 12.14 Use and Return of Class Data. Information provided to Class Counsel pursuant to Evidence Code section 1152, and all copies and summaries of the Class Data provided to Class Counsel by Defendants in connection with the mediation, other settlement negotiations, or the Settlement, may be used only with respect to this Settlement and for no other purpose, and may not be used in any way that violates any existing contractual agreement, statute or the California Rules of Court. Not later than 90 days after the date when the Court discharges the Administrator's obligation to provide a declaration confirming the final pay out of all Settlement funds, Plaintiffs shall destroy all paper and electronic versions of Class Data received from Defendants unless, before the Court's discharge of the Administrator's obligation, Defendants make a written request to Class Counsel for the return, rather than the destruction, of Class Data.
- 12.15 Headings. The descriptive heading of any section or paragraph of this Agreement is inserted for convenience of reference only and does not constitute a part of this Agreement.
- 12.16 Calendar Days. Unless otherwise noted, all references to "days" in this Agreement shall be to calendar days. In the event any date or deadline set forth in this Agreement falls on a weekend or federal legal holiday, such date or deadline shall be on the first business day thereafter.
- 12.17 Notice. All notices, demands or other communications between the Parties in connection with this Agreement will be in writing and deemed to have been duly given as of the third business day after mailing by United States mail, or the day sent by email or messenger, addressed as follows:

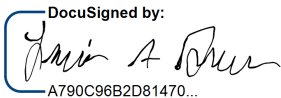

You may be eligible to receive money from an employee class action lawsuit (“Action”) against Clean Earth Environmental Solutions and RHO-CHEM, LLC (“Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM”) for alleged wage and hour violations. The Action was filed by former Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM employees (“Plaintiffs”) and seeks payment of (1) back wages for a class of non-exempt employees (“Class Members”) who worked for Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM in the State of California during the Class Period (February 10, 2024 to December 18, 2025); and (2) penalties under the California Private Attorney General Act (“PAGA”) for all non-exempt employees who worked for Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM in the State of California during the PAGA Period (February 10, 2024 to December 18, 2025) (“Aggrieved Employees”).

The proposed settlement has two main parts: (1) a class settlement requiring Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM to fund individual class payments, and (2) a PAGA settlement requiring Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM to fund individual PAGA payments and payments to the California Labor and Workforce Development Agency (“LWDA”).

Based on Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM’s records, and the parties’ current assumptions, **your individual class payment is estimated to be \$_____ (less withholding) and your individual PAGA payment is estimated to be \$_____**. The actual amount you may receive likely will be different and will depend on a number of factors.

The above estimates are based on Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM’s records showing that **you worked _____ workweeks** during the Class Period and **you worked _____ workweeks** during the PAGA Period. If you believe that you worked more workweeks during the Class Period, you can submit a challenge by the deadline date. See Section IV of this Notice.

The Court has preliminarily approved the proposed settlement and approved this notice. The Court has not yet decided whether to grant final approval. Your legal rights are affected whether you act or not act. Read this notice carefully. You will be deemed to have carefully read and understood it. At the final approval hearing, the Court will decide whether to finally approve the settlement and how much of the settlement will be paid to Plaintiffs and Plaintiffs’ attorneys (“Class Counsel”). The Court will also decide whether to enter a judgment that requires Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM to make payments under the settlement and requires Class Members and Aggrieved Employees to give up their rights to assert certain claims against Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM.

If you worked for Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM during the Class Period and/or the PAGA Period, you have two basic options under the settlement:

(1) Do Nothing. You don’t have to do anything to participate in the proposed settlement

and be eligible for an individual class payment and/or an individual PAGA payment. As a participating class member, though, you will give up your right to assert Class Period wage claims against Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM.

- (2) **Opt-Out of the Class Settlement.** You can exclude yourself from the class settlement (opt-out) by submitting the written request for exclusion or otherwise notifying the Administrator in writing. If you opt-out of the settlement, you will not receive an individual class payment. You will, however, preserve your right to personally pursue Class Period wage claims against Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM, and, if you are an Aggrieved Employee, remain eligible for an individual PAGA payment. You cannot opt-out of the PAGA portion of the proposed settlement.

Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM will not retaliate against you for any actions you take with respect to the proposed settlement.

SUMMARY OF YOUR LEGAL RIGHTS AND OPTIONS IN THIS SETTLEMENT

You Don't Have to Do Anything to Participate in the Settlement	If you do nothing, you will be a Participating Class Member, eligible for an individual class payment and an individual PAGA payment (if any). In exchange, you will give up your right to assert the wage claims against Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM that are covered by this settlement ("Released Claims").

I. WHAT IS THE ACTION ABOUT?

Plaintiffs are former Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM employees. The Action accuses Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM of violating California labor laws by failing to pay overtime wages, minimum wages, wages due upon termination and reimbursable expenses and failing to provide meal periods, rest breaks and accurate itemized wage statements. Based on the same claims, Plaintiffs have also asserted a claim for civil penalties under the California Private Attorneys General Act (Lab. Code, § 2698, et seq.). Plaintiffs are represented by attorneys in the Action: Kenneth Seligson, Esq. of Seligson Law P.C., Shani Zakay of Zakay Law Group, Jean-Claude Lapuyade of JCL Law Firm, and Kane Moon of Moon Law Group P.C. (“Class Counsel.”).

Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM strongly deny violating any laws or failing to pay any wages or reimbursable expenses and contends it complied with all applicable laws.

II. WHAT DOES IT MEAN THAT THE ACTION HAS SETTLED?

So far the Court has made no determination whether Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM or Plaintiffs are correct on the merits. In the meantime, Plaintiffs and Clean Earth hired an experienced, neutral mediator in an effort to resolve the Action by negotiating an agreement (settle the case) rather than continuing the expensive and time-consuming process of litigation. The negotiations were successful. By signing a settlement agreement and agreeing to ask the Court to enter a judgment ending the Action, Plaintiffs and Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM have negotiated a proposed settlement that is subject to the Court’s final approval. Both sides agree the proposed settlement is a compromise of disputed claims. By agreeing to settle, Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM do not admit any violations or concede the merit of any claims. Plaintiffs and Class Counsel strongly believe the settlement is a good deal for you because they believe that: (1) Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM have agreed to pay a fair, reasonable and adequate amount considering the strength of the claims and the risks and uncertainties of continued litigation; and (2) settlement is in the best interests of the Class Members. The Court preliminarily approved the proposed settlement as fair, reasonable and adequate, authorized this Notice, and scheduled a hearing to determine final approval.

III. WHAT ARE THE IMPORTANT TERMS OF THE PROPOSED SETTLEMENT?

1. Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM Will Pay \$595,000.00 as the Gross Settlement Amount (“Gross Settlement”). Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM have agreed to deposit the Gross Settlement into an account controlled by the Administrator of the settlement. The Administrator will use the Gross Settlement to pay the individual class payments, individual PAGA payments, a class representative service payment, Class Counsel’s attorneys’ fees and expenses, the Administrator’s expenses, and penalties to be paid to the LWDA. Assuming the Court grants final approval, Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM will fund the Gross Settlement not more than 30 days after the judgment entered by the Court becomes final. The judgment will be final on the date the Court enters judgment, or a later date if Participating Class Members object to the proposed settlement or the judgment is appealed.
2. Court Approved Deductions from Gross Settlement. At the final approval hearing, Class Counsel will ask the Court to approve the following deductions from the Gross Settlement, the amounts of which will be decided by the Court:
 - A. Up to \$208,250.00 (35% of the Gross Settlement) to Class Counsel for attorneys’ fees and up to \$30,000.00 for their litigation expenses. To date, Class Counsel have worked and incurred expenses on the Action without payment.
 - B. Up to \$10,000.00 to each named Plaintiff, for a total of \$20,000.00, as a class representative award for filing the Action, working with Class Counsel and representing the Class. A class representative award will be the only monies Plaintiffs will receive other than Plaintiffs’ individual class payment and any individual PAGA payment.
 - C. Up to \$6,900.00 to the Administrator for services administering the settlement.
 - D. \$20,000.00 for PAGA penalties, allocated 65% to the LWDA and 35% to individual PAGA payments to Aggrieved Employees based on their pay periods during the PAGA Period.

Participating Class Members have the right to object to any of these deductions except the PAGA penalties. The Court will consider all objections.

3. Net Settlement Distributed to Class Members. After making the above deductions in amounts approved by the Court, the Administrator will distribute the rest of the Gross Settlement (the “Net Settlement”) by making individual class payments to Participating Class Members based on their Class Period workweeks.
4. Taxes Owed on Payments to Class Members. Plaintiffs and Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM are asking the Court to approve an allocation of 20% of each individual class payment to taxable wages (“Wage Portion”) and 80 % to penalties, interests, and other non-wage amounts (“Non-Wage Portion”). The Wage Portion is subject to withholdings and will be reported on IRS W-2 Forms. Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM will separately

pay employer payroll taxes it owes on the Wage Portion. The individual PAGA payments are counted as penalties rather than wages for tax purposes. The Administrator will report the individual PAGA payments and the Non-Wage Portions of the individual class payments on IRS 1099 Forms.

Although Plaintiffs and Defendants have agreed to these allocations, neither side is giving you any advice on whether your payments are taxable or how much you might owe in taxes. You are responsible for paying all taxes (including penalties and interest on back taxes) on any payments received from the proposed settlement. You should consult a tax advisor if you have any questions about the tax consequences of the proposed settlement.

5. Need to Promptly Cash Payment Checks. The front of every check issued for individual class payments and individual PAGA payments will show the date when the check expires (the void date). If you don't cash it by the void date, your check will be automatically cancelled, and the monies will be deposited with the California Controller's Unclaimed Property Fund in your name. If the monies represented by your check is sent to the Controller's Unclaimed Property Fund, you should consult the rules of the fund for instructions on how to retrieve your money.
6. Requests for Exclusion from the Class Settlement (Opt-Outs). You will be treated as a Participating Class Member, participating fully in the class settlement, unless you notify the Administrator in writing, not later than _____, that you wish to opt-out. The easiest way to notify the Administrator is to send a written and signed request for exclusion by the _____ response deadline. The request for exclusion should be a letter from the Class Member or Class Member's representative setting forth the Class Member's name, present address, telephone number, and a simple statement electing to be excluded from the settlement. Class Members who opt out will not receive individual class payments, but will preserve their rights to personally pursue wage and hour claims against Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM.

You cannot opt-out of the PAGA portion of the settlement. Class Members who opt out of the class settlement remain eligible for individual PAGA payments and are required to give up their right to assert PAGA claims against Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM based on the PAGA Period facts alleged in the Action.

7. The Proposed Settlement Will be Void if the Court Denies Final Approval. It is possible the Court will not grant final approval of the settlement or not enter a judgment. It is also possible the Court will enter a judgment that is reversed on appeal. Plaintiffs and Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM have agreed that, in either case, the settlement will be void, Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM will not pay any money, and Class Members will not release any claims against Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM.
8. Administrator. The Court has appointed a neutral company, APEX Class Action (the "Administrator") to send this notice, calculate and make payments, and process Class Members' requests for exclusion. The Administrator will also decide Class Member challenges over Workweeks, mail and re-mail settlement checks and tax forms, and perform other tasks necessary to administer the settlement. The Administrator's contact

information is contained in Section IX of this notice.

9. Participating Class Members' Release. After the Judgment is final and Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM have fully funded the Gross Settlement and separately paid all employer payroll taxes, Participating Class Members will be legally barred from asserting any of the claims released under the settlement. This means that unless you opted out by validly excluding yourself from the class settlement, you cannot sue, continue to sue or be part of any other lawsuit against Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM or related entities for wages based on the Class Period facts and PAGA penalties based on PAGA Period facts, as alleged in the Action and resolved by this settlement.

The Participating Class Members will be bound by the following release:

All Participating Class Members, on behalf of themselves and their respective former and present representatives, agents, attorneys, administrators, successors and assigns, release Released Parties from all claims that were alleged, or reasonably could have been alleged, based on the facts and allegations in the Operative Complaint in the Action, including factual claims regarding Defendants' alleged: (i) failure to pay all regular wages, minimum wages and overtime wages due; (i) failure to provide meal periods or compensation in lieu thereof; (iii) failure to provide rest periods or compensation in lieu thereof; (iv) failure to pay wages timely at time of termination or resignation; (v) failure to provide timely pay wages during employment; (vi) failure to provide complete, accurate wage statements; (vii) failure to reimburse necessary business expenses; and (viii) unfair business practices. This release shall apply to claims arising during the Class Period. Except as set forth in Section 5.3 of this Agreement, Participating Class Members do not release any other claims, including claims for vested benefits, wrongful termination, violation of the Fair Employment and Housing Act, unemployment insurance, disability, social security, or workers' compensation or claims based on events occurring outside the Class Period.

10. Aggrieved Employees' PAGA Release. After the Court's judgment is final, and Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM have paid the Gross Settlement (and separately paid the employer-side payroll taxes), all Aggrieved Employees will be barred from asserting PAGA claims against Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM, whether or not they exclude themselves from the Settlement. This means that all Aggrieved Employees, including those who are Participating Class Members and those who opt-out of the class settlement, cannot sue, continue to sue or participate in any other PAGA claim against Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM or its related entities based on the PAGA Period facts alleged in the Action and resolved by this settlement.

The Aggrieved Employees' Release is as follows:

All Aggrieved Employees are deemed to release, on behalf of themselves and their respective former and present representatives, agents, attorneys, administrators, successors and assigns, the Released Parties from all claims for PAGA Penalties that were alleged, or reasonably could have been alleged, based on the facts and allegations in the Operative Complaint that are alleged to have occurred during the

PAGA Period and the PAGA Notices including, but not limited to penalties that could have been awarded pursuant to Labor Code sections 201, 201.3, 202, 203, 204, 210, 218.5, 218.6, 226, 226.2, 226.3, 226.7, 246, 510, 512, 558, 1174(d), 1174.5, 1194, 1197, 1197.1, 1197.14, 1198, 1199, 2802, 2804, 2699.5, and the applicable IWC Wage Order(s).

IV. HOW WILL THE ADMINISTRATOR CALCULATE MY PAYMENT?

1. Individual Class Payments. The Administrator will calculate individual class payments by (a) dividing the Net Settlement Amount by the total number of Workweeks credited to all Participating Class Members, and (b) multiplying the result by the number of Workweeks credited to each individual Participating Class Member.
2. Individual PAGA Payments. The Administrator will calculate individual PAGA payments by (a) dividing \$7,000.00 by the total number of PAGA Period pay periods credited to all Aggrieved Employees and (b) multiplying the result by the number of PAGA Period pay periods credited to each individual Aggrieved Employee.
3. Workweek Challenges. The number of Workweeks you are credited during the Class Period, as recorded in Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM's records, is stated in the first page of this notice. You have until _____ to challenge the number of Workweeks credited to you. You can submit your challenge by signing and sending a letter to the Administrator via mail, email or fax. Section IX of this notice has the Administrator's contact information.

You need to support your challenge by sending copies of pay stubs or other records. The Administrator will accept Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM's calculation of Workweeks based on Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM's records as accurate unless you send copies of records containing contrary information. You should send copies rather than originals because the documents will not be returned to you. The Administrator will resolve Workweek challenges based on your submission and on input from Class Counsel (who will advocate on behalf of Participating Class Members) and Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM's Counsel. The Administrator's decision is final. You can't appeal or otherwise challenge its final decision.

V. HOW WILL I GET PAID?

1. Participating Class Members. The Administrator will send, by U.S. mail, a single check to every Participating Class Member (i.e., every Class Member who doesn't opt-out) including those who also qualify as Aggrieved Employees. The single check will combine the individual class payment and the individual PAGA payment (if any).
2. Non-Participating Class Members. The Administrator will send, by U.S. mail, a single individual PAGA payment check to every Aggrieved Employee who opts out of the class settlement.

Your check will be sent to the same address as this notice. If you change your address, be sure to notify the Administrator as soon as possible. Section IX of this notice has the Administrator's contact information.

VI. HOW DO I OPT-OUT OF THE CLASS SETTLEMENT?

To opt out of the class action settlement, submit a written and signed letter with your name, present address, telephone number and a simple statement that you do not want to participate in the settlement. The Administrator will exclude you based on any writing communicating your request be excluded. Be sure to personally sign your request, identify the Action as Luis Armando Delgadillo and Charlie Pak v. Clean Earth Environmental Solutions, Inc.; RHO-CHEM LLC, and include your identifying information (full name, address, telephone number, approximate dates of employment and social security number for verification purposes). You must make the request yourself. If someone else makes the request for you, it will not be valid. **You must send your request to be excluded to the Administrator by _____, or it will be invalid.** Section IX of the notice has the Administrator's contact information.

VII. HOW DO I OBJECT TO THE SETTLEMENT?

Only Participating Class Members have the right to object to the settlement. Before deciding whether to object, you may wish to see what Plaintiffs and Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM are asking the Court to approve. At least 16 days before the _____ Final Approval Hearing, Class Counsel and/or Plaintiffs will file in Court a Motion for Final Approval that includes, among other things, the reasons why the proposed settlement is fair and states (i) the amount Class Counsel is requesting for attorneys' fees and litigation expenses; and (ii) the amount Plaintiffs are requesting as a class representative service award. Upon reasonable request, Class Counsel (whose contact information is in Section IX of this Notice) will send you copies of these documents at no cost to you. You can also view them on the Administrator's website <https://www.apexclassaction.com> or the Court's website <https://www.kern.courts.ca.gov/>.

A Participating Class Member who disagrees with any aspect of the settlement or the Motion for Final Approval may wish to object, for example, that the proposed settlement is unfair, or that the amounts requested by Class Counsel or Plaintiffs are too high or too low. **The deadline for sending written objections to the Administrator is _____.** Be sure to tell the Administrator what you object to, why you object and any facts that support your objection. Make sure you identify the Action, Luis Armando Delgadillo and Charlie Pak v. Clean Earth Environmental Solutions, Inc.; RHO-CHEM LLC, and include your name, current address, telephone number and approximate dates of employment for Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM and sign the objection. Section IX of this notice has the Administrator's contact information.

A Participating Class Member can object (or personally retain a lawyer to object at your own cost) by attending the final approval hearing. You (or your attorney) should be ready to tell

the Court what you object to, why you object, and any facts that support your objection. See Section VIII of this notice (immediately below) for specifics regarding the final approval hearing.

VIII. CAN I ATTEND THE FINAL APPROVAL HEARING?

You can, but do not have to, attend the final approval hearing on _____ at _____ in Department _____ of the Kern County Superior Court, located at 1215 Truxtun Ave, Bakersfield, CA 93301. At the hearing, the judge will decide whether to grant final approval of the settlement and how much of the Gross Settlement will be paid to Class Counsel, Plaintiffs and the Administrator. The Court will invite comment from objectors, Class Counsel and defense counsel before making a decision. You can attend (or hire a lawyer to attend) either personally or, if permitted by the Court, Check the Court's website for the most current information.

It is possible the Court will reschedule the final approval hearing. You should check the Administrator's website <https://www.apexclassaction.com> beforehand or contact Class Counsel to verify the date and time of the final approval hearing.

IX. HOW CAN I GET MORE INFORMATION?

The settlement agreement sets forth everything Clean Earth and RHO-CHEM and Plaintiffs have promised to do under the proposed settlement.
